## ANSWERS TO THE QUESTIONS

### DO YOU KNOW WHAT CRASHED INTO THE BANKS OF THE RIVER IRWELL IN 1944?

In **1944**, a Lancaster bomber crashed into the river bank of the River Irwell, while trying to land on the nearby playing fields.

The Lancaster bomber PB304 of squadron 106, which was loaded with bombs, killed all **7**

crew members on board and **2** individuals on the ground.

Today, a memorial of those who passed is situated in Agecroft cemetery, that you can visit on our longer walking route.

### CAN YOU GUESS WHY THE ORIGINAL CELL WAS TORN DOWN?

**1535** saw the destruction of the monasteries by King Henry VIII, where Kersal Cell was overthrown and taken by the crown.

It is thought that the Tudor house that stands today, is built on the site of the original cell. Kersal Cell, which is a grade II listed building, is the second oldest building in Salford and dates back to **1563**.

Since, the Tudor building has been used as a boarding school, country club and a school.

Today the building has been separated into 3 residential homes. However, there are still folklores of the cell, some say that it is haunted and that there are still underground passages from the cell to Manchester Cathedral.

### DO YOU KNOW WHY THE NORTH EAST OF THE WETLANDS IS KNOWN TO THE LOCALS AS THE 'LANDSLIDE'?

In **1882**, there was a massive landslide on Bury New Road and Great Clowes Street. Continuous slips took place over the late 1880s and early 1920s.

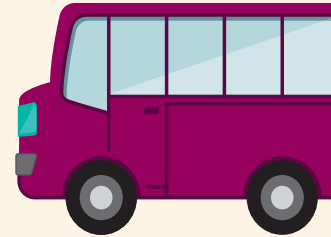
As a result, many drainage schemes were implemented and a river wall was built. Shortly after the wall was built, in **1927** there was a major landslide destroying part of Great Clowes Street.
